The <u>Christmas Program</u> has reached capacity for applications. Unfortunately, we have a limit on the number of children we can serve each year. With the help of hundreds of volunteers and staff, we are now busy packing more than 1,700 boxes of new clothing and gifts for children across Maine.

As the Christmas season draws near, we are struggling to complete the boxes for pick-up as we lack donations. Our dilemma this year is that our stored inventory runs out faster than new donations arrive. There is always a period of time that we struggle to keep enough inventory on hand to keep our packing process moving forward.

The most urgent needs include popular boys and girls toys, warm pajamas and outfits sizes 2 through 12, and craft sets and books for all levels up to age 12. You can find a full list of donation needs at the link here.
