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Harold Alfond Foundation Awards \$400,000 to Teen Parent School Program

The [Maine Children's Home for Little Wanderers](#) is elated to announce that the [Harold Alfond Foundation](#) has awarded the nonprofit with a \$400,000 grant to support the agency's [Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School Program](#) endowment fund.

The Teen Parent School, founded in 1974, is an alternative high school program open to pregnant and parenting teens across Maine. The program provides prenatal and parenting instruction, as well as academic and life skills courses. All students are registered as Waterville High School students and work toward earning a Waterville High School diploma.

A group of Maine Children's Home leaders, staff and board members have worked closely with the foundation to meet their funding criteria and objectives. The grant will be incorporated into the Teen Parent School Program's endowment fund, which will generate new revenue each year. These resources will help to provide urgent funding for pregnant and parenting teens to prepare for healthy childbirths, taking care of newborns and guidance to raise their young children. The support includes instruction on childbirth by a registered nurse, social work guidance, case management, child care, educational support towards the students' high school diplomas and ongoing child-care education.

"We are deeply grateful to the Harold Alfond Foundation for awarding this grant to such an important program. We have been operating our unique model of critical support for pregnant and parenting teens since 1974," said Rick Dorian, The Maine Children's Home executive director. "The



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growth of the endowment ensures the agency can continue helping at-risk teens and their babies far into the future."

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Leaders & Luminaries Recognition for Board President John Stanley

In October, we were thrilled to nominate our board president, John Stanley, for the Camden National Bank -- Leaders & Luminaries award for outstanding service, creativity and commitment to The Maine Children's Home. In 1992, John Stanley was first invited to become a board member. John recently received this plaque from Camden National Bank in recognition of his dedication and service.

John remembers being impressed when he did stories about the agency as news director for a Waterville radio station in the 1970s. John's mother was a long-time member of the Augusta Chapter of the [Friends of The Maine Children's Home](#). She had recruited John's wife, Elaine, and his mother-in-law as Friends members, too, so he had a long-term familiarity with the agency's programs and a personal appreciation for the difference it could make in children and families' lives.

In 1993, he was the president of the Augusta Kiwanis Club (then the largest Kiwanis Club in New England), and helped connect The Maine Children's Home to some of the funding the Kiwanis Club provided to local nonprofit agencies.

In this season where civility and respectful communication are sometimes lacking, John's gifts really shine. He has always modeled clarity, focus and respect. It was during his first term as board president (1993) that a special committee was formed to write the agency's first documented mission statement and multiyear strategic plan. These tools helped to form the foundation for the board and agency leadership, and clarified where the agency wanted to focus its resources. Today, it still provides guidance to the board of directors when they discuss proposals to create, change or discontinue service programs.

We are overjoyed that John's foundational work on the board was recognized and will help to carry the mission and work far into the future. Congratulations, John!

Adoption Unit Successes

It's been a very busy year with much growth in the [adoption](#) unit. In reviewing our statistics for the year, we want to share that the total number of children welcomed into families for 2016 is 20, compared to seven in 2015. We have nearly tripled the number of adoptions! The adoption team is currently managing 164 adoption cases. Great work!
