The Christmas Program at The Maine Children's Home provides boxes of clothing, toys, books and more to income-eligible families for their children who are **12 and under**, who live in the state of Maine, and who are willing to pick up a box at our office in Waterville. Plans are well under way to serve up to 1,700 children this coming Christmas season.

The application will be available beginning October 30 until December 6, or until we reach the maximum number of applicants. # The Children's Place News

Did you guess what was happening in our front play yard? Remember in last month's e-news we gave you the following picture and hints:

- The children and teachers will LOVE it
- The children can use it with their whole bodies, wheels and chalk



Did you guess what it was? Here's the big reveal! We now have a wonderful asphalt path from our parking lot, up through our large play space and connecting our two smaller play yards. We also have a small asphalt circle inside each of the small play yards for ride and push toys.

Not only will this enable easy access to play yards for our infants in strollers (especially in the winter months), but the children have another play surface to enjoy. Push toys, ride toys and children's bodies can travel on this new surface, and temporary artistic masterpieces, using paint and chalk, can be created.

It is critical for early childhood programs to provide quality outdoor play experiences for young children. Many of the developmental tasks that young children must achieve – exploration, socialization, risk-taking, sensory experiences, fine & gross motor development, and vast amounts of knowledge related to math, science, ecology, construction, language and literacy – can be most effectively learned through outdoor play.

# Turner Family Counseling Center News

The Harland A. Turner Family Counseling Center has been given a \$5,000 grant from The Bingham Program to help provide the best-quality counseling for children who have had adverse childhood experiences (abuse, extreme neglect, significant loss, trauma).



THE BINGHAM PROGRAM

We will be using the funds to provide specific graduate level training in evidenced-based play therapy approaches, as well as trauma-focused therapy. We want to be sure that we are helping children and their families in the most effective possible ways, using approaches that are engaging and playful, yet highly therapeutic, to help children work through their adverse experiences and to help families understand how they can be most helpful to their child/children.

This grant has allowed us to bring a highly skilled and experienced Registered Play Therapy Supervisor, who teaches graduate courses in play therapy at universities in our state, right to our campus to provide play therapy-specific training to all of our counselors who work with young children and their families. The other piece this grant supports is to ensure that all of our counselors have been trained in trauma-focused treatment, specifically Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT). TF-CBT is an evidence-based treatment for children and adolescents who have been impacted by trauma, as well as for their parents or caregivers, to understand the impact of trauma on behaviors and emotions so that with this understanding they can truly know how to be present for their child in whatever means is most supportive for that child. This is highly effective treatment and we are excited to now ensure all of our counselors are trained in this TF-CBT model. We are so grateful for the support we have received through this Bingham Program Grant!



Lindsay Bragdon, Adoption Program Director, and Deb Levenseller, Clinical Director, just got back from an incredible training in Texas on Trust-Based Relational Intervention (TBRI)®. To quote one of the presenters and co-author of the book The Connected Child, Dr. David Cross, “TBRI® is attachment-based, trauma-informed, whole-child, multi-systemic, and evidence-based.” Lindsay and Deb are excited to bring this model of intervention to the state of Maine, particularly to support children who have experienced trauma, abuse, and extreme neglect, and often are in the foster care system, or have been adopted domestically or from orphanages internationally. 
